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FRIENDSHIP

Solomon observed the of importance friendships. God created people to be in a relationship with him and to be in relationships with one another. Friends who work on a task together can rejoice together. Friends can help each other if one should fall, the other is there to "help him or her up." Those who have a strong relationship with God and strong friendships with other believers will have bonds that strengthen life's joys and limits life's sorrows. Friendships among believers are precious, for they have the bond of Christ and of eternity. We should both have good friends and be good friends. (Eccl. 4:9-12.)

David and Jonathan, Ruth and Naomi, Job and his friends, Abraham and God, Paul and Barnabas, Jesus and his followers, are all examples of *great* friendships.

We will look at some positive as well as negative friendships and how they are examples for us to follow as believers. David and Jonathan shared a rare friendship. Born out of youthful mutual admiration, their relationship stood the test of difficult decisions and conflicting loyalties. Jonathan the King's son and future heir, befriended David, his father's champion.

Then came the conflict between Saul, the king and David. Jonathan found himself caught between his father and his best friend. At first, he found it hard to accept his father's change of heart toward David. The temptation was to choose one over the other. He chose the truth and faithfulness to God. He remained loyal to both his father and to David. He managed to

keep them apart so, he wouldn't have to take sides. His wisdom earned him David's deep gratitude and Saul's resentment. To Jonathan's credit, he did not allow his father's attitude to drive him away.

Jonathan was never threatened by David's popularity. Whether or not he knew that Samuel had anointed David as the next King,





Jonathan remained loyal. He displayed all the best characteristics of a true friend (1 Samuel 20). The Bible Says in Proverbs 18:24 "He that hath friends must show himself friendly".

Ruth, the daughter-in-law of Naomi became a trusted and loyal friend to her mother-in-law. They were much more than in-laws; they were true friends.

When a famine arose in Bethlehem Judah, Elimelech, his wife Naomi, and their two sons went to the city of Moab. While they were there, both boys grew up and married women of Moab. But when Elimelech and his sons died leaving their wives widows, Naomi decided to go back to Bethlehem, Judah.

She told her daughters-in-law to remain in Moab. One of the women took Naomi's advice and went back to her family. But despite Naomi's attempts to persuade Ruth that she too should return to her family, as it wouldn't benefit her to go, Ruth instead decided to follow her mother-in-law back to Bethlehem. She left her god, and her family, and followed her friend to a strange land. Ruth 1:16-17. Ruth indeed was "a friend that sticks closer than a brother." (Proverbs 18:24)

When Naomi and Ruth came to Bethlehem the people were excited to see them. But because Naomi had lost her husband, her sons, and only had her daughter-in-law with her, she didn't want the name Naomi anymore, but instead chose Mara meaning, "bitter". Little did Naomi know that her pagan friend would cause her to smile again.

Ruth worked in the fields to support her mother-in-law and great friend. She went to the field of a rich relative of Naomi, named Boaz. Boaz fell in love with Ruth, married her and she had a son and brought him to Naomi. Her friendship and commitment put a smile on Naomi's face again.



Abraham was known as a "friend of God" (Isaiah 41:8). These are the qualities that made God recognize him as his friend; he obeyed God, he trusted God, and he took Him at His word. When God told him to leave his father's pagan home he left. When he promised him a son, he believed God, though it took years for it to happen, he trusted God anyway. When God asked him to sacrifice Isaac the son of promise, he obeyed God and God provided a ram for the sacrifice. Abraham was truly a friend of God.

Job also had to deal with his friends. Sometimes friends, in their attempt to support and be a blessing, can misjudge. Job's friends were classic examples of that. They came from miles around to check on Job. He was in such bad shape he was unrecognizable. They sat with him for seven days without saying a word. Sometimes friends just need to be there. But Job's friend also discouraged him by accusing him of sin. They did not know the whole story (Job 2:11). After days of telling Job that he had sinned, God finally intervened, and asked Job to pray for his friends. When Job prayed for his friends, God restored Job's health and wealth.

Saul after he was converted, most of the believers were afraid of him. But one of the disciples named Barnabas became Saul's friend. He carried him to the others and vouched for him. He relayed to them the story of how Saul, later known as Paul, met Jesus on the Damascus Road and was later saved and called to preach the Gospel.

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Barnabas and Paul became Ministry partners and went on two Missionary journeys spreading the Gospel to the Gentiles. Paul and Barnabas had a heated debate over John Mark that eventually caused them to separate. But there is no Biblical indication that they did not still remain friends.

Jesus Christ the Son of God is the greatest friend of all. He said to His Disciples "no greater love has any man than this that a man lay down his life for his friends" (John 15:13). Jesus showed His friendship by dying for our sins on Calvary, Jesus said we are His friend if we do what he says (John 15:15).
